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Dear Parents and Carers

I hope you and your family are well, and enjoying the fact that we are starting to return to some sort of normality over the next few weeks. Of course, this does not change the fact that Year 11 students have experienced significant disruption in the last two years; I am now able to write with precise information about the next few important weeks and how BBEC will arrive at and submit grades for students this year.

Teachers will determine student grades this year, based upon a range of evidence verified by the school. These results will then be reviewed by the exam boards who designed each course, before awarding the final grades which reflect student performance on content which has been taught and allow students to confidently progress to the next stage of their education or into employment.

How will students be assessed?

Teachers are gathering evidence through a range of assessments in different GCSE subjects during this half-term; there will a series of shorter topic or unit tests in class and a series of mock exams completed in formal exam conditions.

A summary of tests and exams this half-term can be found at the end of this letter. Students now have their own personalised list of all mock exams up to half-term.

Teachers may also use other evidence, such as other work completed in class, for homework, or previous mock exams. No one test or exam score will determine the grade to be awarded – teachers are asked to give a 'holistic' view when awarding the grade, which means taking as much evidence into account as possible.

Teachers will initially determine students' grades, which will then be reviewed by the school. The professional judgement of teachers will only be based on what students have been taught. Teachers do not need to assess students on every aspect of each subject, they just need a range of evidence that shows student performance on the aspects which have been taught.

Teachers will follow very much the same process for BTEC subjects; teachers are working with students to complete all units so that they can assess the work and submit a grade.

In most cases, the range of evidence that teachers use to inform the grade will be consistent across the class or cohort for each qualification. However, the school may decide that a different range of evidence may be more appropriate to fairly inform the grade, if, for example, a student has missed significantly more teaching than others in the class.









Keeping you in the know

Teachers will inform students about which pieces of work will be used as evidence. Please raise any concerns about the evidence being used, for example, if the evidence was affected by personal circumstances, such as illness. Teachers will make the final judgement about what evidence is to be included - this is not a negotiation. Teachers will not be able to tell students the grade they have submitted to the exam board.

It is important to say that much like with exams in normal years, the grades issued by teachers, schools and colleges will not take account of student potential. They will be a snapshot of the standard students are performing at, based on a wide range of evidence. It should be no easier or harder for students to achieve a grade this year based on their performance than in previous years.

What happens after my teacher determines my child's grade in a subject?

Once a teacher has determined a student's grade, it will be reviewed by other teachers in the school, so grades are determined consistently with the school's policy. Exam boards will check these policies to make sure they meet their requirements.

Reasonable adjustments, access arrangements and special consideration

If students have special educational needs, and/or are disabled and require reasonable adjustments, the school should have ensured that these were in place when evidence was gathered. Where appropriate reasonable adjustments were not in place when a student took an assessment which is being used as evidence, the teacher should take that into account when determining the grade. The school could also consider whether other evidence could be used instead.

If you have any questions about how personal circumstances will be taken into account or want to raise anything with the school, now is the best time to speak to us. Please do not wait until after results day.

When will my child receive their grades and what happens next?

Year 11 students will receive their GCSE and BTEC results on Thursday 12 August 2021. Further details about results day will be sent to you in July.

Appeals

Although everyone will be working hard to make sure you are issued with the correct grades on results day, there will also be an appeals system as a safety net to fix any genuine errors that were not identified earlier. Please see the JCQ guidance for full details on appeals – detailed information will be sent out later and will be available on results day.
