
Well done Jennifer!

"Air Cadets as a whole is really interesting. You start as a recruit, wearing an unflattering green overall, there is a lot of work before you do a test to become a first-class cadet. As a first-class cadet you can go flying and shooting as I have done. There is a small start up fee which pays for your first squadron dinner night and hire of uniform, you then pay a reasonable monthly amount. You have Parade twice a week where you have squadron activities, First Aid, archery and a lot of cleaning! If you put in the time and effort you can work your way up to a corporal, then a sergeant. These positions are hard to get but easy to lose.

As a first-class cadet, you can fly and travel with people from the squadron to meet up with others from other squadrons. You will then have a briefing and learn how to escape the plane if an emergency occurs. You get kitted out then actually in the plane. You can go above 3000 feet and over the Yorkshire Dales, do barrel rolls and flips in the air. As you fly in a tutor plane, you take control of the plane and learn how to bank left and right, how to steer the plane and use the pedals. Coming back down, you feel heavy, like you have been compressed in a tiny box. It is fun, I really recommend it.

Cadets can be time consuming and what you put in you are more likely to get out of it. You will spend hours learning how to do drill, how to march to go on parades, such as the Remembrance Parade. Drill is repetitive, you spend ages going over the same movements, perfecting them until perfect. You must have your uniform clean and ironed or face the humiliation of having to wear horrible, ugly recruitment coveralls. You can do DofE through cadets, bronze, silver and gold. Overall I love it! Hard work, but the rewards are amazing"




26 European Day of Languages 2022


Years 7 and 8 took part in the incredible Geography Gameshow from our American friend Neal Nichols.
