Bradford Schools Pandemic

RECOVERY SUMMIT



On the 19th of November 20 students from the Wellbeing department of BBEC's student parliament took part in a fantastic virtual conference with lots of other schools from across Bradford.

The purpose of this summit was to meet and discuss the research students had been doing in school regarding the effect of the Pandemic, in a number of different key areas. BBEC students attended three workshops: one on racism throughout the pandemic; one on the impact of poverty during the pandemic and one on the lost voices of LGBTQ youth during the pandemic. 10 students from BBEC participated in, and presented a workshop with two other BDAT schools all about the effect that the pandemic had on young people's mental health.

They shared their fantastic presentation, filled with testimony from students and staff at BBEC, as well as students from the primary school, The Academy at St Johns. All students who took part were fantastic representatives of the school and had some thoughtful things to say:

Everyone had a contribution, no one was left out. Every school had everyone saying something, it was a good time and we solved a lot of problems."

"I learned that other schools have the same problems we do and we can use ideas about how they are tackling their problems to help our problems. Everyone had really good ideas."

"I felt confident, I felt confident when I was presenting too."

"I didn't want to talk, but I did. It was only Charlie that was talking so I spoke so the pressure wasn't on him."

"I feel like by telling schools what we do we can help other schools to improve. We could have helped other schools so they know who to call – we could have made them more aware of the different people they can call if they need help."

But this is not the end; after Christmas, we will continue our work on Mental health and we will be meeting some important members of the Bradford community to discuss these issues further. Keep your eyes peeled for our next conference!




The World's Biggest Coffee Morning on Friday 24th September is Macmillan's biggest fundraising event for people facing cancer.




CAREERS NEWS
