

Trash Plot Summary

- 1.Raphael and Gardo are working through the rubbish when they find a bag that holds, a wallet, a map, a key, eleven hundred pesos, an ID card, a few old papers and photos.
- 2.José Angelico's picture is on the ID card. He is 33, unmarried and employed as a house boy, in a place called "Green Hills". The photos are of a little girl in a school dress. The same night the police come to their neighbourhood and Raphael realises that the bag is what they are after.
- 3.They all go to the station and use the key on the locker. On their way back, they look at what they found: a letter with an address: Gabriel Olondriz, Colva Prison and a slip of paper with a line of numbers.
- 4.When they get back they use a computer at the Mission School to search up information about José Angelico and Gabriel Olondriz.
- 5.That same night the police come and search Raphael's home and he gets arrested. When the police take Raphael to the station, he gets interrogated by the police who use physical violence.
- 6.After a while, they let him go, and Raphael is thankful to be alive and free, unlike poor José Angelico who was beaten to death during his interrogation.
- 7.The boys then 'investigate' what the slip of numbers mean and why José Angelico was beaten to death by the police, they find out that the slip of numbers is a book code linked to Gabriel Olondriz's bible. They also learn that José Angelico was arrested for robbing a lot of money in an unexpected way, and he was killed by the police when he was being interrogated.
- 8.When they finish their research, they decide to go on the run. They manage to get a hold of Gabriel Olondriz's Bible and crack the book code, which leads them to a cemetery.
- 9.At the cemetery, they discover that José Angelico has a daughter named Pia Angelico. They then recover the stolen money which they use for the greater good. The boys then escape Behala with Pia for good.

Stave 1: Marley's Ghost

- The story starts on Christmas Eve. Scrooge is visited by his nephew, Fred, who invites him round for Christmas Dinner, but Scrooge refuses because he hates Christmas.
- He sends away two men who come to collect money for charity because he says the poor deserve their fate, and is cruel to his clerk, Bob Cratchit.
- At home alone He sees the face of his dead business partner, Marley, on the doorknob.
- The Ghost tells Scrooge he will be visited by three spirits that night, and if he doesn't change after this, he will suffer the same fate as Marley.

Stave 2: The First of the Three Spirits

- The ghost of Christmas past takes Scrooge to a village where he grew up.
- Scrooge sees his younger self at school, where he is spending Christmas alone.
- His sister Fan arrives to take him home from school.
- Fan tells Scrooge his father has changed and is much kinder now – the family celebrate Christmas together.
- Then, Scrooge is shown a vision of a Christmas Eve party, organised by his old boss, Mr Fezziwig.
- Finally, Scrooge is taken to see the moment his fiancée, Belle, broke off their engagement because of Scrooge's obsession with money.
- He then sees Belle grown up, with a family of her own. Scrooge feels regret as Belle's family represent the life Scrooge could have had.

Stave Three: The Second of the Three Spirits

- The ghost arrives and is dressed in colours to represent Christmas and, the room is filled with lots of Christmas décor
- Scrooge and the ghost visit Bob Cratchit's family, who are enjoying their Christmas Day.
- Scrooge learns that Tiny Tim will die in the near future because of the family's poverty.
- Scrooge and the ghost visit Fred's house. The people there make fun of Scrooge because of his attitude towards Christmas.
- The ghost takes Scrooge to visit the various different poor people at Christmas, which includes the festivities of an isolated community of miners and a party aboard a ship.
- Just before the ghost leaves, he reveals two starving children hidden within his robes called 'Ignorance' and 'Want' after the problems that cause poverty in Victorian Society

Stave Four: The Last of the Spirits

- The Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come comes to collect Scrooge.
- Scrooge is shown the consequences of a lonely life, as he is shown the reactions of some businessman to the death of an unknown man.
- Then, the ghost shows Scrooge a group of people who are trying to steal and sell the man's belongings.
- They claim that if he wanted to keep them after his death, he should've been less wicked in life – then he wouldn't have died alone.
- The ghost takes Scrooge to visit Bob Cratchit's family.
- Scrooge discovers Tiny Tim has died, and the Cratchit's are very upset.
- The ghost takes Scrooge to a graveyard, and points to a grave with Scrooge's name on it. Scrooge promises to the ghost that he will honour Christmas and change his life.

Stave Five: The End of It

- Scrooge finds himself back in his own on Christmas Day.
- Scrooge meets one of the charity collectors, and donates a large amount of money to their cause.
- Scrooge buys the Cratchit family a huge turkey for Christmas. Scrooge learns to honour Christmas, as he laughs and wishes passers-by a Merry Christmas.
- Scrooge visits Fred's house for Christmas and enjoys dinner with his family.
- The next day, Scrooge gives Bob Cratchit, his clerk, a pay rise.
- We're told that Tiny Tim will survive, and that Scrooge celebrates Christmas for the rest of his life.
