On 21 November, we said goodbye to a well-loved and highly valued ex-member of staff. Sarah Brookes worked at the school as a progress support leader in our maths department for five years.

Sarah threw herself into school life from day one, coming into school early to enable students to use the sports facilities before school and arranging sporting activities for staff after school every week. She quickly identified the need for the school to have a member of staff trained to support young carers and took on that responsibility. As well as supporting in the maths department, Sarah was also passionate about working with our students in the foundation learning department. She was a member of staff who always went over and above the call of duty to look after our more vulnerable students.

Sarah was diagnosed with skin cancer in October 2016. She continued to work whenever she was well enough. She retired due to ill health in May this year and still came into school as a volunteer, being especially keen to support with transition.

Sadly, she lost her fight on 27 October, leaving behind her beloved husband and two children. It is testament to her character that so many of the students from her form group as well as current and former staff attended her funeral.







BBEC students have enjoyed their chance to experience democracy in action. The past three weeks have seen students being nominated for school prefect and a place on the BBEC school council.

Then followed a week of campaigning and the final week of voting. Over 1400 votes resulted in the election of 100 prefects from Year 7 to Year 11.

Many students have campaigned on very strong agendas and campaigned in assemblies and convinced fellow students to vote for them, which has been a tremendous opportunity for them to develop confidence and resilience.

Here's what one of our 6th formers had to say about their research adventure:

When we went to the zoo, we carried out psychological studies on different animals. My group observed monkeys and giraffes. The study we conducted mirrored those of Shaffer, Ainsworth and Harlow's research on attachment. By being able to conduct the study ourselves, it gave us a better idea as to how Harlow and others gained their information and the studies we learnt about.'

Here's what Year 12, chimp chaser and researcher in the making has to say.....

"Year 12 and 13 Psychology students from our sixth form were rewarded by a trip to Chester Zoo in order to take part in an observation into the behaviour of animals in relation to their parents. They spent a few hours of closely monitoring the monkeys before moving onto the next mammal for comparison. Students picked animals such as elephants and rhinos and conducted the same method to observe and record behaviour in their groups. After hours of dedication, patience and hard work they were finally able to explore the zoo freely. The coach set off at 9am returned to school approximately 5pm. Everyone emphasised how truly amazing and overwhelming the experience of approaching animals was to them. Findings from the trip to Chester Zoo were then acted upon and further researched into work for the next few lessons. The whole concept was useful to students understanding behaviour." Fiza







Fire Station Visit




Six students from Bridge (the school's alternative provision facility) were invited to attend a programme led by West Yorkshire Fire Brigade at Fairweather Green fire station.

The students undertook various challenges; the first one was simulating a cargo drop to a disaster area by devising a method for a small bag of lentils to arrive safely on the island following a 3 metre drop without breaking open. The students had a budget of £25 for materials such as sponge, card and string. Our boys' team won the drop, and spent the least money, and the girls won the prize for the best design.

The second challenge was a design and build drag car race. Our girls' team won this challenge by building the car that went the furthest.

Our students really enjoyed the day and were great ambassadors for the school.




Four members of the Sports Academy volunteered to help out at a roller-sticks primary school festival.

Our first fixture was against the host team, so we knew it would be a challenge to get any kind of result. To the surprise of the team, we finished as comfortable winners, with a 4-2 score line thanks to some forward thinking play from Harry Smith to quickly scoot from acting half and place the ball down for a couple of tries.

Other notable fixtures included Laisterdyke. Carl Norman managed to show tenacity in defence, which prevented our opponents from taking an early lead. Twice we went ahead, courtesy of strong carries from Cody Birkett and Joshua Field (the metre eaters). Joshua Keegan managed to find his scoring boots and turned on the after-burners, which ensured no player was within 10m as he placed the ball down. The resilience of our opponents was testament to them, as they twice pegged us back, however a last minute solo effort from Man of the Match Harry Smith ensured we took a narrow victory.

The most notable game of the evening was between the two undefeated schools, Queensbury and us. For the first time this evening, we went behind immediately after the kick off. We thought we had drawn level, as Joshua Orimogunje went half the length of the field and into the corner. A contentious decision from the referee meant we were still losing at half-time.
